Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils in our school, irrespective of circumstance and background will achieve well and make good or better progress in all areas of the curriculum in each year of learning at Maidensbridge.

The focus of our Pupil Premium Strategy is to ensure that our most vulnerable pupils have equal access to resources to enable them to achieve well and make good progress, as well as always accessing high quality wave one teaching. This includes ensuring that these children attend school regularly.

Research from the EEF has proven that the best way to close the attainment gap for pupil premium children is high-quality wave one teaching as well as effective and frequent feedback.

We will carefully identify the challenges and barriers to learning of our pupil premium children and make sure that our strategy reduces these barriers.

To ensure our strategy is successful we will:

- involve the views of our pupils and their parents or carers
- provide CPD for staff and ensure lessons have high expectations and challenge for all
- regularly review the impact of our strategy and make adaptations if necessary

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	<p>Overall attendance for pupil premium children for the year 22-23 was 94%, 1% below the school average of 95%. This was an improvement on the previous year of 92%.</p> <p>Attendance monitoring has also shown that 4 pupil premium pupils have a high rate of persistent absence. This was largely due to absence in the first term then pupils attending school after the register had closed. This persistent absence therefore effects the overall percentage for PP children.</p>
2	<p>Assessments and observations of our youngest children in Reception on entry to school show that there are still undeveloped oral language skills</p>

	and vocabulary gaps and underdeveloped physical skills including children's core strength which affects their readiness to write.
3	Though most pupil premium pupils made the expected progress in the year 22-23. Some individual pupils did not make the expected progress in specific areas. Last academic the percentage of SEND/SEMH was (11) 68% and there were 2 (12%) with an EHCP. A barrier again this year is that (8) 53% of our pupil premium children are also SEND/SEMH. (3) 20% of our pupil premium children have an EHCP.
4	Phonics assessments show that some of our pupil premium children continue to need support in decoding and reaching a good functionality of reading for their age in KS2.
5	Our observations and discussions with families have indicated that some of our pupil premium children are suffering with greater social and emotional issues.
6	After discussions with our pupil premium children, they are keen to join in the extended life of the school and improve their mental health and wellbeing through accessing clubs and activities with their peers.

Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022 to 2023 academic year.

Overall attendance for PP children is now 94%. This was 2% below target. However, this was just 1% below the school average and 2% above the previous year which demonstrates a positive increase.

Four pupil premium pupils have a high rate of persistent absence. This was largely due to absence in the first term then pupils attending school after the register had closed. This persistent absence therefore also effects the overall percentage for PP children

There are not any identified pupil premium pupils in Reception cohort 22-23.

Data

Internal assessments for 2022/23 showed that:

In reading 14 children out of 16 made the expected progress. Of those that did not make the expected progress, one child has an EHCP and the other child needed lots of SEMH support during the school year.

In writing 10 children out of 16 made the expected progress. Similarly of those that did not make the expected progress, two children have EHCPs and another child needed lots of SEMH support.

In Maths 11 children out of 16 made the expected progress. Of those that did not make the expected progress, there is one child with an EHCP and another child that needed lots of SEMH support during the school year.

For children who have attended, they have enjoyed their extra-curricular experiences and feel part of the school community.

44% (7) have attended after an after-school club.

19% (3 children) have attended two after school clubs. During this academic year barriers to attending after school clubs need to be explored so that next year's attendance will be higher.

25% (4 children) had subsidised individual peripatetic music lessons.

1:1 phonics tutoring helped a child pass the year 1 phonics screening check.

100% accessed Century Learning.

81% (13 children) accessed TT Rockstars.

63% (10) have attended regular Nurture sessions or received nurture support.

During the last academic year, pupil premium children were also offered discounted residentials and trips, technology to support learning at home and uniform vouchers.

We have formulated our pupil premium strategy through conversations with children, analysis of previous data and trends. We have also read and reflected on the research and guidance from the EEF toolkit and used programmes with proven success such as Read Write Inc and Century to ensure progress for our children.

We have planned for this strategy to be for this academic year due to the ever-changing situation of education for children and the changing context of our school. We have a small amount of pupil premium children, and we want to ensure that the spending is as personalised as possible and addresses the needs of the current children in school. Therefore, we will review this annually as new children join us and needs change for our pupil premium children.
